## External Trade of Macao in the Third Quarter of $2005^{\text {a }}$

## A. External Trade

## Imports and Exports

External trade value of Macao in the third quarter of 2005 amounted to MOP 14.75 billion, up $3.3 \%$. Imports and exports had different performance, where the value of imports grew $16.1 \%$ to MOP 8.77 billion, up from $3.6 \%$ recorded in the previous quarter, while decrease in exports moderated from $33.5 \%$ recorded last quarter to $11.0 \%$ to MOP 5.98 billion. The export-import ratio rose to $68.2 \%$ from $52.3 \%$ in the second quarter of 2005 . Trade deficit narrowed from MOP 3.55 billion to MOP 2.79 billion, but still amounted to a year-on-year increase of MOP 1.96 billion.

Performances in Macao's two traditional major export markets, namely the US and the EU, were again less than favourable. Value of exports to the US plunged $11.0 \%$ to MOP 3.20 billion (down from $35.9 \%$ in the previous quarter); value of exports to the EU dropped $19.4 \%$ to MOP 1.06 billion (an apparent improvement compared with the $70.5 \%$ in the previous quarter). Value of exports to Mainland China slid $13.7 \%$ and value of exports to Hong Kong rose $13.2 \%$. In terms of type of exports, value of textile and garment products, which made up $81.6 \%$ of the total export value, fell $11.7 \%$. Meanwhile, value of other exports decreased $8.2 \%$.


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## Domestic Exports

In the third quarter of 2005 , domestic exports accounted for $77.7 \%$ of the total export value, at MOP 4.65 billion, down $13.3 \%$. Garment and textile products, which constituted $92.8 \%$ of total domestic exports, dropped $10.1 \%$ in value, among which, exports to the US diminished $10.0 \%$ and those to the EU fell slightly by $1.4 \%$.

Domestic exports still concentrated in the formerly restricted textile and garment products, whose value consisted of $81.6 \%$ of the total value of domestic exports and fell $4.4 \%$; exports to the US slid $3.7 \%$ and those to the EU recorded a mild increase of $0.2 \%$.

In terms of domestic exports of the formerly unrestricted garment and textile products, total export value plunged by $37.4 \%$, among which, exports to the US tumbled by $39.5 \%$ and those to the EU plummeted by $25.5 \%$.

In terms of non-textile products, exports of machinery, apparatus \& parts, which made up $0.7 \%$ of total domestic exports, fell $13.5 \%$ in value. Value of footwear exports, which constituted $0.2 \%$ of total domestic exports, plummeted further from $91.0 \%$ in the first quarter to $96.0 \%$ in the third quarter.

In addition, results from the Industrial Export Survey of the third quarter of 2005 indicated that the average length of time of the orders on hand of the interviewed manufacturers was 3.1 months, up $3.3 \%$ from 3 months in the previous quarter and down $6.1 \%$ from 3.3 months in the same period of 2004 respectively. Meanwhile, among the interviewed manufacturers, $39.2 \%$ and $15.9 \%$ predicted slight and substantial growth respectively in the domestic industrial exports in the next 6 months whereas $19.9 \%$ and $25.0 \%$ predicted very slow and stagnant growth respectively. In general, more than half of the interviewed manufacturers expressed optimism towards the prospects of exports in the next 6 months.

## Re-exports

In the third quarter of 2005 , re-exports, which made up $22.3 \%$ of the total export value, shrank 2.3\% in value. Mainland China and Hong Kong remained to be the two largest re-export markets, constituting $50.3 \%$ and $26.6 \%$ of the total re-export value respectively. Re-export value to Mainland China dropped $15.5 \%$ whilst that to Hong Kong fell $8.0 \%$.

In terms of the main re-exports, namely raw materials \& semi-manufactures, which made up $53.6 \%$ of the total re-export value, shrank $14.5 \%$ in value. Re-exports of capital goods, fuels \& lubricants and consumer goods recorded growth of $11.2 \%, 43.6 \%$ and $0.1 \%$ respectively.

## Imports

Imports continued to grow in the third quarter of 2005, growth of import value expanded from $3.6 \%$ in the previous quarter to $16.1 \%$ in this quarter, the highest growth recorded this year. Mainland China continued to be the largest source of imports for Macao. Imports from Mainland China, accounted for $45.0 \%$ of the total import value, grew $11.3 \%$. As regards other import markets, Taiwan China fell $5.4 \%$, whereas the EU, Japan, Hong Kong and the US went up $12.9 \%$, $37.4 \%$, $8.8 \%$ and $21.9 \%$ respectively.

In terms of the main imports, namely consumer goods, which made up $39.6 \%$ of the total import value, increased $9.9 \%$ in value. Raw materials \& semi-manufactures, which accounted for $32.6 \%$ of the total import value, rose $18.8 \%$. Meanwhile, capital goods and fuels \& lubricants, which made up $18.7 \%$ and $9.1 \%$ of the total import value, surged $20.5 \%$ and $27.2 \%$ respectively.
